EDU 241: Educational Technology Cyberbullying, Social, and Ethical/Legal issues

Overview:

Students will have the opportunity to lead a discussion on some of the most pressing issues related to cyberbullying, social, and ethical/legal issues. The following section outlines the steps leading to this discussion.

Class #1: Social, Ethical, and legal issues

- Assigned to one of three discussion groups (cyberbullying, social, or ethical/legal issues)
- Within your group, discuss strategies that lead to meaningful discussions.

Class #2: Social, Ethical, and legal issues

- Prepare to lead the discussion for your assigned topic
 - The second page has some questions to consider (you will respond to them individually before meeting with your group). Feel free to use these question however you wish.
- Your discussion should:
 - o Last approximately 15 20 minutes
 - Present key information related to your topic, while also including at least two discussion topics for the class. NOTE: It is NOT expected that your discussion group provide a formal "presentation" (i.e. powerpoint, prezi, SmartBoard, etc).

Class #3: Social, Ethical, and legal issues

• Each group will have 15 – 20 minutes to lead the class in its assigned topic

Group #1: Cyberbullying:

- 1. How would define cyberbullying?
- 2. Why do people Cyberbully? Resource: see "Cyberbullying Article"
- 3. What can the teacher and/or school do to stop/prevent Cyberbullying?
- 4. When should the administrators and/or police become involved in cyberbullying?

Group #2: Social Issues:

- 1. Has social networking (i.e. Facebook, Twitter, etc) changed how individuals interact? The social dynamic within school?
- 2. How do you think teachers and schools should embrace the ubiquitous (i.e. existing everywhere) nature of technology? *Resource: see "Article #1"*
- 3. What technology "fads" do you think will persist (i.e. ipads) *Resource:* see "Article #2"

Group #3: Ethical/Legal Issues:

Some critical questions regarding Ethical and Legal Issues with technology:

- 1. How has technology affected ethical issues within education, particularly plagarism (i.e. "Turnitin.com"; *Resource: See turnitin.com*)
- 2. Should teachers and/or administrators have the authority to monitor emails and/or other electronic communication between students?
- 3. What is the teacher's responsibility for educating students about information on the Internet? When should these conversations take place (i.e. what grade)?
- 4. What type of policy should the school put in place for Internet use (i.e. "Acceptable Use Policy")? *Resource: see the below website for an example Acceptable Use Policy in a school:* http://www.rockypointschools.org/aup.html

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
